Introducing Capa

Capa is a 7-year-old Belgium Malinois, known as the best breed for military, Navy Seals, and police dog training. Malinois have been bred for strength, loyalty, and intelligence.

Sometimes known as a "Mal" or even "maligator" because when they grab onto an object their jaws clamp on and the dog does not release until they are directed.

A Mal is not suggested for a family dog, only because the dog loves to work, brisk activity, they need training in their youth.

Navratil began his police experience in 2003 with the Kankakee Auxiliary; was hired by Momence Police Department in 2005; became a canine handler in 2007; hired by Aroma Park in 2015 as Assistant Chief of Police to Henry David; and was recently hired as Police Chief in St. Anne.

To become a canine handler, 500 hours with the dog are required, approximately ten weeks. Trust and loyalty are established during this training. Navratil and his first canine, Pete, trained in Cook County and they were a team until Pete became ill. Capa replaced Pete as Navratil's new partner. Capa is also certified.

Navratil plans to put Capa to work at our local schools to check lockers and allow the students to get used to his presence. Working dogs take their jobs seriously and do not respond to petting and hugs by children unless they have grown up together.

Since Navratil has been in St. Anne, cameras have been added to the downtown area and the park area will soon be included. Many of these have been added with the help of grants.

The Safety Act has been mandated by the state, but the state offers no funding to support their dictates. Car cameras and body cameras will be a necessity in the future. Depending on the size of the community, requirements vary as per when they must be installed and used. St. Anne is a relatively small village; therefore, we have a few years before we must have them.

Our current police officers include: Russ Hoekstra, Doug Duncan, Emma Fox as well as part-time officers Earl Corbitt and Josh Rasmussen. Navratil and the above officers are hoping to build bridges with the community. Crisis Intervention Training is part of their program, dealing with behavioral disorders and juvenile

crisis. The officers are also trained in health emergencies such as a paramedic and use of CPR. Money is always an issue for training. In order to keep our community safe, the village seeks to find grants to supplement our needs.
